Meeting Centre Support Program 3Bridges Community Limited Carss Park, NSW

Recognised for piloting the 'Meeting Centre Support Program," a Dutch, evidence-based initiative that provides person-centred, comprehensive and integrated program support to people with mild to moderate dementia and their family members, enabling them to adjust and to cope with the condition.
