HESTA scholarship granted to 10 rural health students to inspire

their future leadership

Ten university students with a passion for rural and remote health are the winners of a new scholarship provided by superannuation fund, HESTA, in partnership with Rural Health Workforce Australia.

The scholarship will enable these aspiring future health leaders to attend the National Rural Health Conference in Cairns from 26-29 April. The conference attracts more than 1,000 delegates, including inspirational health advocates and political figures.

Two Indigenous students were among the scholarship winners chosen from more than 150 applicants belonging to university Rural Health Clubs affiliated with the National Rural Health Student Network.

HESTA CEO, Debby Blakey, said more than 150 outstanding scholarship submissions were received, with the 10 winners demonstrating their commitment to improving the health outcomes for rural communities around Australia.

"The scholarship winners are all potential future leaders in rural health and have displayed outstanding commitment to the delivery of the highest levels of health care, with many already contributing to rural communities through their studies," Ms Blakey said.

"HESTA is proud to support these students as they begin their careers. It's also particularly pleasing to contribute to the professional development of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander rural health students as part of our Reconciliation Action Plan that supports efforts to close the health gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples."

Candidates were assessed with particular emphasis on their commitment to practising in rural Australia.

Scholarship winner Kelleigh Allport says her career goal is to return to rural communities to help address inequity in rural and Aboriginal health.

"As a young Aboriginal medical student, I know of the need for Aboriginal doctors in rural areas who have a better understanding of the cultural needs of the community, making healthcare more accessible to Indigenous people."

"I want to be able to educate my people about health issues that may affect them, promote healthier lifestyle choices that will reduce the risk of chronic disease and help people live longer and healthier lives."

RHWA Chair, Dr Ross Maxwell, hopes the scholarship winners will be inspired by the opportunity to rub shoulders with and hear from some of the leaders in Australian rural and remote health.

"Young people like this represent the future of rural health and we are delighted that HESTA has chosen to invest in them."

The scholarship covers the costs of flights, accommodation and registration for the four-day conference, hosted by the National Rural Health Alliance – an umbrella body for 38 national organisations committed to improving the health and wellbeing of the seven million people who live in rural and remote Australia.
